Pacific Studies Research Cluster

Introduction

The Pacific Research Cluster is a network of leading Pacific scholars who both teach and research on the Pacific that will provide links both within Otago and with other institutions. It is envisaged that the Cluster would be a perfect vehicle for advocacy. Issues where the Cluster could provide opinion would be on funding priorities (scholarship and research), Policy direction, Ethics, etc. Such opinion should be based on good scholarship and this is what the cluster aims to provide.

In summary, the Cluster has fulfilled its goal of becoming a forum for facilitating research in the Pacific, providing expertise across departmental boundaries and hosting a body of Pacific expertise to comment on and provide considered advice on policy and advocacy based on quality research.

Progress

Members of the cluster have carried a number of activities related to the objectives:

The Pacific Studies Research Cluster has had an active year. The first meeting was held on March 26th and attended by 11 academic staff and post-graduate students from Anthropology, Education, History, Peace and Conflict Studies, Social Work and Te Tumu, with apologies from staff in Music, Anthropology, Geography, Tourism, International Health and Economics. There was discussion about more active exchanges with Pacific universities, and the need to work more closely with the French in the Pacific. As well as occasional seminars, the idea of a research symposium was discussed with interest expressed in doing something as a tribute to Professor 'Epeli Hau'ofa of the University of the South Pacific Oceanic Centre for Arts and Culture who had recently passed away. Agreed to pursue this but to ensure there was time to plan for what could be a major event, and also to make sure that there would be a tangible output, such as a publication.

Te Tumu and the Pacific Cluster co-hosted a visit and talk by Samoa Head of State, Tui Atua Tupua Tamasese Ta'isi Efi on March 9, 2009.

On March 19th, three members of the Pacific Cluster (Prof Tony Binns and Dr Jenny Bryant-Tokalau) participated in a Panel Discussion on 'The Future of NZAid and the need for principled Aid policy in New Zealand'. Discussion looked at whether New Zealand's Aid program be targeted at eliminating poverty or economic development and whether MFAT should be responsible for allocating aid money. This arose from the MFAT proposal to change the distribution of NZ's aid and discussed the place for public input into the process. The discussion was held in Burns 2 in front of a large audience. Chaired by Professor Philip Nel and including as speakers, Grant Robertson MP, Dr Jenny Bryant-Tokalau, Professor J A (Tony) Binns and Professor David Fielding, there was a range of viewpoints on Aid, impacts of cutting NZAID and merging it with MFAT and opinions for the best direction of NZ's Aid program in the future.

Two Pacific cluster seminars were held during the year. The first on May 13th by Dr Chris Kavelin of Macquarie University was on 'Indigenous knowledge, traditional medicines and intellectual property law with Australian aboriginal community'. This was well attended, particularly by students of the Masters of Indigenous Studies programme. The second seminar, on September 7th was a presentation by Kees Keizer of DevNet (Wellington) on 'West Papua: the forgotten conflict'.

The highlight of the year was the Pacific Research Cluster Symposium held on October 21st. Entitled '*An Oceanic Imagination: A Tribute to the Life and Mind of 'Epeli Hau'ofa*', this highly successful symposium attracted between 40 and 50 delegates in the course of the day, with more visitors on the 22nd to view the 'Red Wave' art exhibition which was also on show. Drs Jenny Bryant-Tokalau and Patrick Vakaoti were responsible for the organization of the day which included presentations from key Pacific researchers: Associate Professor Ropate Qalo, Sociology Department, University of the South Pacific, Suva, Fiji; Mr Josaia McNamara, Artist, Oceanic Centre of Arts and Culture, USP, Suva; Ms Karlo Mila-Schaaf, Performance Poet; Associate Professor Judy Bennett, History Department, Otago; Dr Ian Frazer; Dr Steve Ratuva, Pacific Studies, University of Auckland. Ema Tavola, Pacific Arts Coordinator, Manukau City Council; and Luisa Tora, Activist/Writer. Other members of the research cluster actively participated as facilitators and in providing summaries of the panels (Professor Paul Tapsell, Drs Greg Rawlings and Greg Burnett), as well as students, members of the public and staff from a wide variety of University departments. Members of the Tongan and Fijian communities from both Otago University and the wider Dunedin area were fully involved with the smooth running of the day, preparations and the evening dinner and performances. The symposium also attracted visitors from Lincoln and Massey universities.

Papers presented included a range of themes including '*A Tribute to our Oceanian 'Epeli Hau'ofa*'; '*From Tales of the Tikongs to a Sea of Islands*', '*Epeli and my life as an artist*' and '*Visions of building Pacific representations through the arts*'. Each of the speakers has been asked to provide a copy of their paper and it is anticipated that a book built around the presentations as well as the art work, and poetry also presented in the evening and later by email, will be produced. Dr Bryant-Tokalau is currently compiling the materials and will take them to the University of Hawaii during her RSL in January where she hopes to interest the University of Hawaii Press in publishing the collection.

Additional work

Several members are routinely involved with reviewing book manuscripts, editorial boards, mentoring of students and staff, chairing monthly post-graduate student seminars (Pacific Island Centre), and Talanoa series.

Links between Otago and other institutions continued and maintained through the active involvement of Dr Jenny Bryant-Tokalau, Michelle Schaaf, Dr Charlotte Chambers and several post-graduate students on the Pasifika Talanoa network, a BRCSS funded initiative which through the GRID network hosts fortnightly seminars of Post-graduate students working on the Pacific. Otago hosted the seminars once during the year with two of our students presenting their work to an audience from all main campuses around the country. The BRCSS meeting in Wellington on June 10 – 12 also provided very good networking and presentation opportunities for the Otago students (6 from Otago participated).
