ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

The specific entry requirements vary slightly for each paper.

Common to all papers are the following:

- 1. Admission to the paper shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Studies of the Division of Health Sciences.
- 2. Every candidate shall
 - have been admitted to a degree or have an appropriate professional qualification;
 - present evidence of ability for advanced level academic study.

COST

The course fees are the standard fees for a 30 point postgraduate paper at the University of Otago. The fees have not yet been set for 2013 but as a guide the total fee in 2012 is \$2401.03.

Students are generally expected to meet the costs of travel and accommodation for the block courses unless part of specific contracts which cover this.

ABOUT THE PAPERS

The papers outlined below are distance taught and offered nationally. All papers involve one or more weekend or weekday block course.

PSMX404 - ASSESSMENT OF ADDICTION & COEXISTING DISORDERS

Coordinator: Dr Fraser Todd

The emphasis of this course is on the development of clinical skills in the areas of comprehensive clinical assessment and treatment planning for patients with addiction problems, including coexisting substance use and mental health disorders (dual diagnosis).

PSMX404 involves two three-day block courses in Christchurch and approximately eight audio conferences.

PSMX422 - TREATMENT OF ADDICTION & COEXISTING DISORDERS

Coordinator: Dr Daryle Deering

PSMX422 comprises two three-day block courses and an email discussion group. Students will usually have completed either PSMX404, PSMX401, or equivalent, as a prerequisite. The paper emphasises a multi-systems

perspective and collaborative working relationship with clients, their significant others, whänau, health and other social services. There is a focus on working with clients with complex needs who often have coexisting mental health and social problems.

PSMX416 - APPLIED THEORY OF ADDICTION & COEXISTING DISORDERS

Coordinator: Dr Simon Adamson

This is a paper suitable for anyone working in the addiction and broader mental health fields, be it in treatment, policy, health promotion or other related areas, or for those wishing to further their knowledge in this area. The paper aims to give a broad overview of addiction and coexisting disorders, to give a sound grasp of the current biological, psychological and social theories of addiction and to understand the applications of this knowledge base in clinical practice.

The paper is run as a combination of an online discussion forum, one three-day workshop in Christchurch and a series of audio conferences.

PSMX424 - PHARMACOTHERAPY OF ADDICTION & COEXISTING DISORDERS

Coordinator: Professor Doug Sellman

This paper is geared towards senior clinicians in the addiction treatment field who either prescribe, or work closely with those who prescribe, medications for patients with addiction and coexisting psychiatric and medical problems. The paper is run as a combination of two two-day block courses and email discussion around a series of clinical cases.

The course focuses on the management of people being treated with medications for addiction and coexisting disorders and covers the use of a wide range of common medications.
