McKinlay Oration Speaker for 2012

Dr Stephen Luby

The Centre for International Health is very pleased to host Dr Stephen Luby as the first McKinlay Oration Speaker at the 2012 OIHRN conference.

Dr Stephen Luby has served at the International Center for Diarrheal Diseases Research, Bangladesh (ICDDR,B) since 2004 where he currently directs the Centre for Communicable Diseases. He is seconded from the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and is the Country Director for CDC in Bangladesh.



Dr. Luby's research focuses on public health, water, sanitation, and

communicable disease. He has spent much of his career in the developing countries where these issues have the highest toll on health. He has published > 180 papers in this field. Dr. Luby's work has recently been profiled by the Lancet. His Lancet profile is available at the web address below:

Member Profile

Professor John Crump - McKinlay Professor of Global Health Centre for International Health, University of Otago, Dunedin.

John graduated from the University of Otago Medical School in 1993 and trained as both an internist in infectious diseases and as a pathologist in medical microbiology, training at Christchurch Hospital, New Zealand; the Royal Free Hospital, London; the Canberra Hospital, Australia; Duke University Medical Center; and with the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. John is a Fellow of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians, a Fellow of the Royal College of Pathologists of Australasia, a Fellow of the Royal



College of Physicians of the United Kingdom, and a diplomate of the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. His main interests are in the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of infectious diseases in developing countries, with particular focus on febrile illness; invasive bacterial diseases especially the salmonelloses; bacterial zoonoses; HIV; tuberculosis; and enteric infections. John lived in Moshi, Tanzania, from 2002-11 where he served as Director of the Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Centre Clinical Research Site and Director of Duke Tanzania Operations for the Duke Global Health Institute.
