EC2102: It's important to attend every tutorial and make sure you know how to answer the questions intuitively, mathematically, and graphically. I would say this is the hardest paper out of all 3 papers I was taking, but it is manageable to get at least a B. Also, you have to at least present your solutions for tutorial questions at least once in class, in order to get your participation mark for this paper.

GEX1015: The prof's lectures were delivered very well, so I highly recommend you attend every inperson lecture. During tutorials, you will have a chance to discuss some philosophy trilemma with your peers, and it will be fun. Make sure you do the weekly quiz well, because it counts quite a bit towards your final grade. The final exam is not very easy but also can be handled if you train your logical thinking well throughout the semester, but however, the concepts they taught can be sometimes ambiguous, make sure you email the prof or TA to know what definition they want to use.

PL1101E: This module is graded by weighing your score of 4 online quizzes (have to open your camera and do them on Examplify) throughout the sem and a final onsite exam, though they are open book exams, it is important to make sure you get good grade for those 4 online quiz and because of the time constraints, you actually don't have much time to check your book often, so make sure you revise well before each exam. In terms of the tutorial, they are not compulsory, but they are fun to attend, so I really recommend you to join the in class discussion and activities with your peers. You will also need to form a team within your tutorial to do a project (video) that weighs 30% towards your final grade, but it is fun too

How did the academic experience/workload/style of teaching differ from Otago?

Workload- Local students usually like 5 papers per semester, compared to us who have 3-4 as our normal workload. They all study hard, and are being very active during tutorials in terms of attend class discussions and present their workings to other classmates.

Style of teaching- They teach in ways that make students want to listen more, as in, trying to make students to be more curious about what they are studying, rather than making them feel like they have to listen because they need to pass the exams.

Accommodation

What accommodation did you stay in? What were the pros and cons of your accommodation? I applied for UTown Residence (with Air-con), PGPR (Type A), and UTown Residence (without Air-con) as my first, second, and third preference respectively. I got in my first choice, ie. UTR (with AC), and I would say it is the best accommodation place for exchangers.

Pros: It is the centre of NUS, and it is surrounded by 2 convenience stores (FairPrice, Octobox), one bakery, one hair salon, ATMs, 2 food court (Fine Food and Food Cliques), Subways, Italian restaurants, Japanese and Korean restaurants, as well as 'Super snacks' (usually people go there for supper because it opens till 2-3am). Also, inside each food court you have more than 10 food type options (western, Middle East, Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Malaysian, Singaporean, Fruits and juice, snacks, drinks, etc), as well as 3 bubble tea shops in total (吃茶三千,Gongcha,Coconut Queen).

In UTown, there are 3 public bus stops and one school bus stop, if you want to go to MRT station/lecture, you can all take school bus, and it's free ©

Money matters

Please detail your basic costs, e.g. accommodation, flights, visa, food, insurance

Food: in school canteen (eg. the Deck, Techno Edge, Frontier) usually is \$4-\$7 per meal, in UTown food court (Fine Food, Food Clique) is usually \$5-\$9 per meal). If you go to the mall for meals, it would be around \$6-18 for a proper meal. If you go to residential area's food court, it would be around \$4-8 in general.

What means did you use to access your finances? What would you recommend? (Credit card, Cash passport, foreign bank account, etc.)

In malls I mainly use credit card (visa card), but in school foodcourt/canteen/hawker centre outside of school, you need to either use PayLah, PayNow, or cash.

In order to use PayLah and PayNow, you have to open a local bank account (eg. DBS) and it takes 2 weeks or longer to receive it, then you can transfer your money into that account and use it. Personally I didn't bother to get one, because in UTown and all MRT stations they have DBS ATMs that can withdraw money with \$5 transaction fee, so before I headed to sg I already changed some sgd cash for daily use on food, I also withdrew money in Singapore using ATM (only once).

For taking train and bus, you can just go to the MRT station and ask to buy a EZLink card, and top up it as you use using the machines inside the MRT station. Please note that bus drivers cannot top up for you!

Visas & Insurance

Did you have to apply for a visa? What was the process?

You can apply the Student Pass (Student visa) once you receive your offer from NUS in Nov. Then NUS will send you a very comprehensive email giving you all the instructions for applying visa on the ICA website.

Once you get the IPA letter that allows you to enter sg for 30days, you are done with the first stag of application. Then if you have already booked your flight ticket, you can make an appointment on Jan on the ICA website for going to the ICA building in person to your Student Pass card.

The alternative is that you can wait for NUS to have the student pass session that allow you to do the process onsite in school, but for that one, you cannot get your card straightaway but have to wait for 2 weeks, whereas the appointment that you can make online allows you to get it straightaway, it's just that you have to go there early in the morning on the day of your appointment, to get a number and wait for them calling you, but it will only take half a day at max.

After holding your Student Pass card in hand, you are able to leave/enter Singapore for travel till it expires.

Did your host university have a mandatory insurance?

When you apply for student visa(STP), you have to pay for STP insurance.

Also, university have a mandatory insurance: Group Personal Accident Policy, and you will pay it along your miscellaneous student fee. (once you get the offer, they will give u a brochure that has all the steps for everything, so don't worry! Just work on it along their instructions)~

Extra-curricular/Social Activities

What organised activities were available to students? What extra-curricular activities would you recommend to future exchange students?

They have many CCAs that you can join (especially if you are going on sem1, because most of them are recruiting on sem1. But if you are going on sem2, you can still join by checking out this website (CCA (nus.edu.sg)) and contact them to ask for more information.

What was the university/city like?

The university is nice. If you don't get a chance to stay in UTown Residence, I strongly recommend you to visit UTown, because it is one of the famous places in NUS. For FASS (Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences) students, your lecture rooms are usually near the Deck Canteen and the Central Library, and you will be climbing up and down stairs quite often.
