How do Otago University staff obtain over 70% response rates with student evaluation questionnaires?

Otago staff who obtain response rates in excess of 70% do many of the following¹:

Planning the questionnaire

- Coordinate the scheduling of evaluations with their colleagues.
- Obtain student feedback throughout the teaching block and from multiple sources such as class reps, class discussions, requests for written/emailed/verbal feedback, and other online surveys (e.g., Menti.com, Google surveys).
- Timetable evaluations in student course books (e.g., 'exam and student evaluation class') then time the evaluation to be emailed to students minutes before the class starts.

Leading up to and starting the questionnaire

- Tell students that they run evaluations to improve students' experience of the paper.
- Provide examples of how previous feedback has shaped the paper and its teaching.
- Highlight that responses are confidential.
- Strive to create a good rapport with students and invoke reciprocity I feedback on your work, you can now feedback on mine.
- Explain that students should expect an email invitation from evaluation@otago.ac.nz.
- Let students know that they can also complete evaluations via a link on the home page of Blackboard and Moodle.
- Embed this evaluation link into laboratory computer tasks.
- Provide, or ask students to bring, a device to class/tutorial and allow 10 minutes at the start or mid-way through to complete the questionnaire.

While the questionnaire is running

- Update their class with the current response rate relative to a desired target rate plus thank those who might have completed an evaluation and remind those who might yet do so.
- Remind students verbally, and via email and Blackboard of their opportunity to evaluate.

¹ The 60 staff who shared their practices had run evaluations between 2018 and 2019 with classes of at least 30 students (10% had over a 100 students). All had response rates of at least 70% (median = 77%).
