PLD National Priorities refocused

The national priorities for professional learning and development (PLD) have been refocused to support teachers and leaders and align with the focus on curriculum, progress and achievement. The new priorities come into effect from term 3 2020.

The new priorities for English medium settings are:

- Cultural capability
- Local curriculum design
- Assessment for learning

The new priorities for Māori medium settings are:

- Mātauranga and te reo Māori
- Marau ā-kura
- Aromatawai

Digital fluency remains a priority for teachers and leaders in all schools and kura.

The new online PLD application system will be operational for Term 1 2020 allocations.

A School Based Science Project



Our Science Facilitator, Stephen Williams (stephen.williams@otago.ac.nz), is supporting teachers at Taita College to develop a series of teaching and learning activities around the restoration of a wetland area adjacent to the school. The area consisted of marshes dominated by brambles. Students, with support from the council, have cleared the area and introduced native plants without the use of herbicides.

Students also wanted to reduce the school's waste sent to landfill and set up a worm farm to break down

food scraps. The worm-wee will be used as a fertilizer for the seedlings in the wetland area. Activities included learning about the characteristics of living things and applying these principles to create and maintain a successful worm farm. This has involved monitoring changes in worm population, pH and temperature.

The facilitator and teacher, Deepak Prasad, co-constructed resources to support students. This included writing about the biological and physical changes occurring in the wetland as well as describing the relationships in the food web. The Learning Progressions Framework will be used to monitor progress as well as providing feedforward for the students' next steps. Everyone is excited that they're making a difference.

ESS Facilitators at Moeraki

ESS facilitators visited Moeraki marae in December 2019, warmly hosted by Nola and Patrick Tipa. The visit provided an opportunity to share our stories, and to learn more about the local area. Nola and Patrick led us on a visit to Katiki point, where we were privileged to see hoiho (yellow-eyed penguin), kekeno (fur seals), and Te Raka a Hineata Pa site.
