## Cancer Research at Otago: Setting the Scene

Cancer originates and evolves through the blind power of natural selection, driving cell survival and growth at the expense of the whole organism – all in the abbreviated, precious interval of a lifetime. Although this evolutionary drive that leads to cancer is relentless and indiscriminate, humankind is unwilling to simply accept it as the price we pay for life. Why do we resist? Because the disease is cruel in its unpredictability and timing, uniting us in a fundamental need to protect ourselves and our families. The only way for society to achieve this desired protection is through continued research into cancer's causes, consequences, prevention strategies and treatments.

Research provides many opportunities to reduce cancer's impact on our lives, ranging from the identification of lifestyle and genetic risk factors, to early diagnosis, better treatment and improved patient management and support. The University of Otago leads research into New Zealand's national cancer priorities and the challenges of delivering better, more equitable care into our own health system. The University also excels in fundamental and translational cancer research, strengthening New Zealand's connectedness to the international research community and providing a conduit for the more rapid adaption of global knowledge to New Zealand patients.
