Principles of Law, Medicine and Ethics is a super enjoyable and a relatively simple paper. It was my favourite of the semester. Miscarriages of Justice is a little more intense with more preparation needed. It has heaps of guest lecturers so if you enjoy meeting some experienced people it could be interesting for you. The differences between UK and NZ law were not really a problem for me. I found comparing the two very interesting which made the content more enjoyable. The two psychology papers were fine, definitely easier than those at Otago. The law ones were probably easier than Otago's too.

Overall the learning experience is very similar to Otago you won't need to make any major adjustments. In my experience there were more internal assessments as oppose to exams. Even when it seems there is an exam it often turns out to be an open book exam that can be worked on for a few days or weeks.

Accommodation

What accommodation did you stay in? What were the pros and cons of your accommodation? I stayed at Oak House on the Fallowfield campus. If you enjoy socialising then Oak is BY FAR the best accommodation option for you. The rest seemed to be significantly less lively whereas the people and social culture at Oak made it super easy to make friends. There really is no other Manchester hall that comes close.

Oak house is self-catered and consists of 8 person mixed flats (girls upstairs, boys downstairs). Even though most people were first years, it's not unusual for people to take multiple gap years so they were not all 18 year olds like it seems to be at Otago. My flatmates were all 18-20 however there were older people around too, it did not matter. People happily mingle with a wider range of ages at UoM in comparison to UoO.

Oak House is significantly cheaper than the other options. This is reflected in the quality of the accommodation but the flats are still perfectly liveable.

There are people drinking most nights and they head to the clubs a lot later than what's normal at home and therefore stay out a lot later too. If you are a light sleeper and don't enjoy going out then Oak House probably isn't the best choice for you. I would still recommend staying in Fallowfield as there are other halls that are less sociable in the area but are easier for meeting people than City Campus or Victoria Park.

Fallowfield is further away from campus than the other two but this really is outweighed by the great people in the area. I usually walked to University which took around 30-45 minutes. A lot of people bus, this takes around 15-20 minutes and they come super regularly.

Money matter

The semesters accommodation was around \$4860.

Flights ended up at **\$2,600** return, it was very difficult to find affordable tickets home though. I ended up having to book flights to Sydney then book a different airline home from there which brought down the price significantly.

A 6 months visitor visa is free.

When I shopped at Aldi, Tesco or Lidl I would have a week's food for around **\$40**. It got a bit more expensive when I shopped at Sainsburys which is the most convenient from Fallowfield.

I got student safe insurance. I did around 6 months with 30 days in Europe for **\$657.75**.

Bus's around Manchester or to campus are around **\$4**. You can get a bus pass but it's not that cheap and for me it wasn't worth it.

I used Wise. Super easy to use and significantly cheaper than using your NZ cards.
