#### 1. Introduction

- ~ 30% of 18-24 year
   olds are current smokers
- 29 NZ public tertiary education institutions
- Employ large workforces
- Lessons transferable to other large workplaces





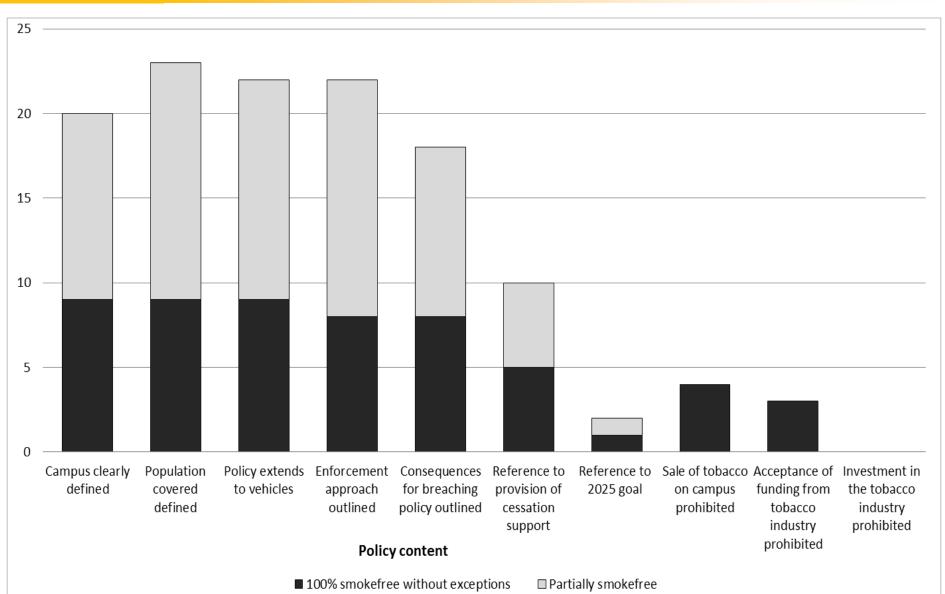
# 1. Current status of smokefree campus policies in NZ

100% smokefree campus policies (no exceptions)	9	16
Partial smokefree policies	17	10
No policy identified	3	3

## 2. Policy planning: barriers & challenges

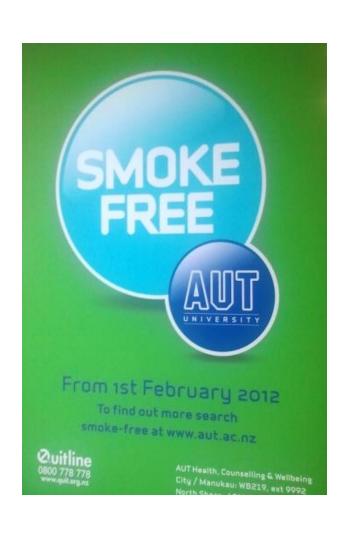
- Relocating smokers to perimeter
- Campus geography
- Enforcement
- Perceived opposition
- Perceived impact on student enrolment
- Time/ resources
- Lack of senior management buy-in

### 2. Policy planning: facilitating factors

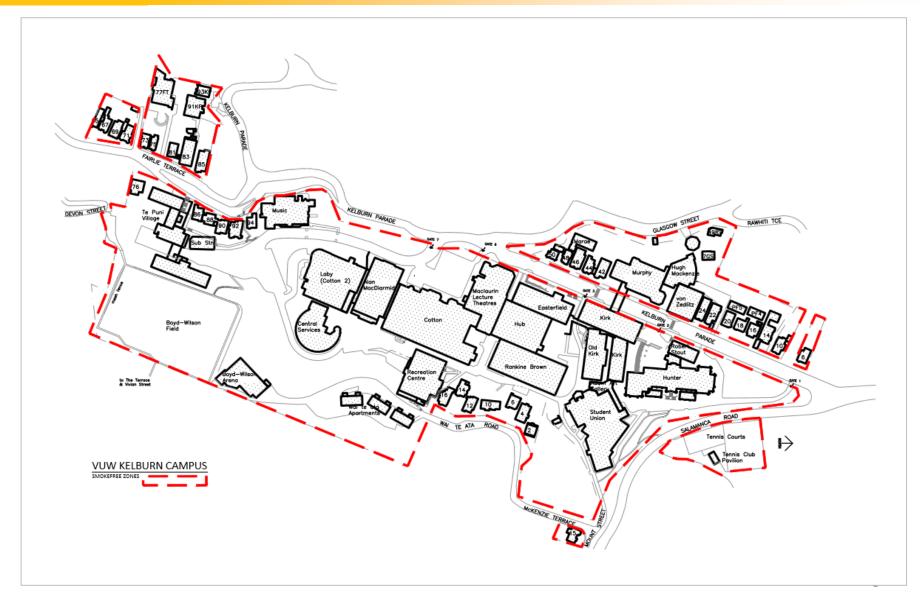


- Wider move towards smokefree environments (playgrounds/ hospitals)
- Staff and student support for policy
- Key leaders/ policy champions

# 4. Post-implementation: experiences and perceptions



- Institutions with 100% smokefree campus policies reported:
  - Little or no opposition
  - No impact on student enrolment
  - Some non-compliance
  - Quit attempts
  - Enforcement easier than designated area policy



# 4. Post-implementation: experiences and perceptions

#### Smokers reported:

- Initial sense of imposition / grievance
- Understanding of policy aims and benefits
- Acceptance and compliance





#### 4. Post-implementation: effectiveness

- Observed compliance high (Otago University)
- U.S. 100% smokefree policies associated with decreased student smoking & tobacco denormalisation
- No such NZ studies (yet)





#### 5. Conclusions

- Need to support remaining NZ institutions to become smokefree
- Some existing "smokefree" policies could be enhanced
- Many perceived barriers can be "debunked"
- Lessons re: policy process are transferable hospitals, rest homes, large business campuses
