#### How did the academic experience/ workload/ style of teaching differ from Otago?

I took 4 papers/courses and had one 3-hour seminar per class. I did find that the workload was a lot more intensive and constant than at Otago where I tended to have busy and quiet periods. My classes were all internally assessed so I didn't have any finals. I did have a lot of presentations, almost one per week! My papers were structured in a way that had lots of little weekly assessments or mandatory requirements (including attendance) which kept me busy!

# Accommodation

What accommodation did you stay in? What were the pros and cons of your accommodation?

I stayed in the Kingston Housing Coop. I lived in a house with nine other flatmates, (but the house was so large it didn't feel like there were ten of us!). There were five international students on exchange and five domestic students. I was on the (optional) meal plan which is a little bit like halls in that those on the meal plan eat together in a central dining hall which is nice, you get to meet people from all over the world! Overall though, you have way more independence than being in a hall! The co-op also runs events and has a budget for each house to hold events/parties. It's definitely an option worth considering, my room was fully furnished and warm - all utilities, maintenance services, and cleaning supplies are included in the cost. I got the international student package and my room came with linen, pillows, duvet, towels, and a desk lamp.

Studentsafe Insurance: \$780 NZD (zero excess)

Accommodation: Kingston Housing Co-op: \$4000 CAD for accommodation (incl utilities, laundry etc) plus \$1850 CAD for the meal plan, and \$70 CAD for the international student package.

Spending money: Approx \$9,000 NZD (day-to-day expenses plus travel including 2x 1 week cruises, flights/accommodation/food/activities for New York, Vancouver, Alaska, Calgary, and Arizona, and train rides to Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal etc)

I used the Wise card, would highly recommend!

Both of these are pretty simple to apply for with a NZ passport, relatively quick turnaround too.

Did your host university have a mandatory insurance? Yes, UHIP - \$252 CAD for one semester

# Extra-curricular/Social Activities

What organised activities were available to students? What extra-curricular activities would you recommend to future exchange students?

Your student ID card gives you free access to the gym and you can pay \$70 CAD for access to the gym's group fitness classes for the semester (same system as Unipol). I also joined the Queen's Equestrian

Club, it cost \$260 CAD for 7 riding lessons and access to the club's social events etc, it was so much fun! The Outdoors Club was great too, cost \$20 CAD to join, just note that you have to enter a lottery for their trips, but they're so much fun!

#### What was the university/ city like?

Very similar vibe to Otago and Dunedin. Kingston is very student-oriented, uni and town are close to each other. Queen's has a really pretty campus, especially in the snow!

#### Any recommendations for things to do, places to visit, places to eat etc.?

Crave in downtown is amazing! Common ground on the second floor of the ARC on campus is also great! Super affordable and a great wee study/catch-up spot!

Definitely worth taking the ferry over to Wolfe Island and driving/cycling to Big Sandy Bay beach (although there is a small fee to enter!).

#### Any tips for future students?

The local Kingston bus is free with your student ID!

The group fitness classes at the ARC are \$15 off during the first week of classes (\$70 CAD instead of \$85 CAD)

Queen's students can get a free ticket to most of the home sports games (ie football), definitely worth taking up if you're into watching sport!

Definitely make the most of your time, if you don't have classes on Mon/Fri, take the long weekends and go to Toronto, Ottawa, or Montreal as they're close enough for a long weekend trip!

Kingston can get cold in the winter, especially when the wind comes off Lake Ontario, so definitely worth packing a good down jacket, windbreaker, and a pair of boots/shoes that have decent tread as it can get icy.

A few travel tips/hacks:

- If you book early enough, the train costs the same as the bus and is a much more pleasant way to travel (it's quicker and has Wi-Fi onboard!). Discount day is Tuesday.
- Most of the Canadian airports have a free express security service, which saves heaps of time standing in security queues! Bookings open 72hr before your flight departs.
- A lot of the airlines have promotions but unlike in NZ, you have to enter a promo code to get the deals, either sign up to the airlines' mailing lists or go to the sale section online to get the promo codes!

I am so glad I went on exchange! I have met so many new people and had some great experiences! Queen's and Kingston are great and everyone is super friendly! I will treasure the friends and memories I have made over the past six months forever!
