OGHI 10th Annual Conference

The 10th annual OGHI Conference was held 15-16 November, and was well attended, with presenters and delegates from various countries and institutions. The theme of the conference was "Health and Development", and Prof Mark McGillivray of Deakin University delivered the McAuley Oration on this topic, examining the links between economic development and health outcomes in developing countries. Prof McGillivray's oration provided a bridge between the OGHI Conference and the Australasian Society for Infectious Diseases (ASID) Conference which followed on 16-18 November.

Other presentations covered research in education, economics and health systems, infectious disease, nutrition, Asia-Pacific and biocultural health, and work being undertaken by OneHealth.

Delegates and visitors also enjoyed the colourful artwork created for the conference by the learners at MacAndrew Bay School.

The Student Prize for the best poster presentation went to Yonatan Dinku, for his poster on Neighbourhood ethnic diversity and child health outcomes in Ethiopia.

The best oral presentation Student Prize was won by Mike Maze, who discussed his work in Social and health system determinants of mortality among febrile inpatients in Tanzania: a prospective social biopsy cohort study.

The 11th Annual Conference, which will focus on nutrition, is planned for the end of November 2018 and will link with the 2018 Pacific International Health Symposium and for the third and final time with the Australasian Society for Infectious Diseases New Zealand Conference. We have secured Prof Ken Brown, a prominent expert in human nutrition from University of California (Davis) and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, as our keynote speaker for the 2018 conference.
