I primarily used cash and my debit card – I would recommend to other people that they get a cash passport if they are going for a short enough time that they cannot get a foreign bank account. I didn't get one before I left and it was super annoying and expensive to constantly pay banking conversion rates on transactions.

For NZ citizens studying in the UK for under 6 months, you only need a short-term student visa, which you can get at immigration provided you show documentation that you are studying.

Did your host university have a mandatory insurance?

Not sure – I got my own insurance regardless.
