From a Search for Rangatiratanga to a Struggle for Survival: Criminal Justice, the State and Māori 1985 to 2015

Dr Kim Workman, Victoria University

The 1980's was a period of political complexity and contrast, and impacted deeply on the public sector and future Māori development. This seminar focuses on the efforts of Māori to exercise rangatiratanga (autonomy) within the criminal justice space, the response of the state and criminal justice agencies to the surge of Māori confidence, and the implications for the development of the criminal justice system over the next three decades.



Dr Kim Workman, (DLitt Well) QSO, Ngati Kahungunu ki Wairarapa and Rangitaane o Wairarapa, is an Adjunct Research Associate at the Institute of Criminology, Victoria University. He is currently writing a book on 'The Criminal Justice System, the State and Māori from 1985 to the Present' which will be published in 2017.
