Congratulations to Warren Tate, who this year rounded off his collection of honours with the Marsden Medal, awarded by the New Zealand Association of Scientists to "honour a lifetime of outstanding service to the cause or profession of science, in recognition of service rendered to the cause or profession of science in the widest connotation of the phrase."

In 2010 Warren received the Rutherford Medal (from the Royal Scociety of New Zealand to "recognize exceptional contributions to the advancement and promotion of public awareness, knowledge and understanding in addition to eminent research or technological practice by a person or group in any field of science, mathematics, social science, or technology") and in 2011 he was named as a Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit for "services to science".
