Application Guidelines for Music Performance

Application Details for Performance Music Papers in the School of Performing Arts, Te Kāhui Tau, University of Otago

Guidelines for new students:

There are two main areas of performance music at Otago University:

- 1. Solo instrumental or vocal performance (MUSI143, 18 points) including contemporary voice, musical theatre voice, classical voice, keyboards, electric guitar, bass guitar, drums, piano, violin, viola, cello, woodwind instruments, saxophone, brass instruments, organ, taonga pūoro (Māori musical instruments), taiko drumming (from Japan) and koto (from Japan), Scottish Highland bagpipes, and Scottish Highland drumming.
- 2. **Ensemble music (MUSI144, 18 points)** including these three options:
 - (a) Chamber music, on classical musical instruments
 - **(b)** Jazz ensemble, on any of the following: guitar, bass guitar, keyboard/piano, drums, vocals, saxophone.
 - (c) Vocal ensemble, open to all types of voices and styles

All the options in Nos. 1 and 2 above require previous experience and an audition, except for taonga pūoro, taiko drumming and koto where no previous experience or audition necessary.

There is a third option for students wanting to learn a second instrument or take a one-off performance paper as part of other degrees: **MUSI 140 Performance Studies 1 (18pts).** You may audition for MUSI140 in any of the instrumental and vocal options listed in Nos. 1 above. However, staff may prioritise students auditioning for MUSI 143 and MUSI 144 papers. Traditional World music performance is typically taken in MUSI 140 though students with sufficient previous experience may be permitted to take MUSI 143 in these options.

You can include MUSI 143, 144 and 140 in a Bachelor of music degree, a Bachelor of Performing Arts degree (BPA), a B.A. in music, and in any other University of Otago degree.
