If you have never studied French before and are wanting to take a French paper you must take Introduction to French. The university will not allow you to take any other French papers. When signing up for papers you need to search for classes.

How did the academic experience/workload/style of teaching differ from Otago?

I chose to have a more relaxed workload while on exchange. I only took 3 papers which meant my longest work day was 2 hrs and I only had class 4 days per week. This was a lot less than others I was on exchange with. I would recommend this as it made my exchange far more pleasant and gave me far more time to explore Scotland. I would also recommend doing all internal papers like the ones I took as they didn't have a large workload during the semester and I finished before the exam period, again giving me more free time to explore.

The teaching style was very similar to Otago, but the French paper was a series of tutorials with no lectures.

#### Accommodation

What accommodation did you stay in? What were the pros and cons of your accommodation?

I stayed in Thomas Campbell Court which was student accommodation. It had a series of flats of 4 or 8 people in an apartment complex. It is set up similar to Caroline Freeman College at Otago. The flats have a full kitchen so you cook your own food which made it a lot cheaper than catered accommodation. When applying for halls, just put that you wish to be in the exchange hall and they'll put you with other exchange students, otherwise you can end up with freshers.

Would also recommend signing up for a hall as soon as the application becomes available. You will likely receive a message from Strathclyde saying there is less than a 30% chance of you getting a hall as places are limited. Don't worry I believe Otago spaces are guaranteed (Ask the exchange office maybe), and there are more places available in the exchange hall than in the first year halls. If you don't get a hall just request to be placed in one in the first week of Uni when you arrive, they usually have free beds. I had a few friends from other countries get a room this way.

## Money matters

All costs are in NZD so it may be more expensive or cheaper depending on the exchange rate. But we had a bad exchange rate of about 2.08 NZD for a pound. Usually it's below 2.

There is an Erasmus Society at Strathclyde that organises events for exchange students that made it easy to meet other people on exchange. They also organise trips around Scotland and abroad during the semester if you don't like planning for yourself. Plus their membership card gets you discounts on Scotrail and Ryan Air.

What was the university/city like?

The university is the modern one in Glasgow in the east end. Much more of a party university than The University of Glasgow. Think of Strathclyde as Otago and Glasgow more like Victoria Uni. It is only a 15 min walk from the best clubs and bars.

Glasgow as a city is great and full of real Scots. Known as the Scottish capital of Scotland were as Edinburgh is known as the English Capital of Scotland. Lots of character and is only an hour from the highlands.

Any recommendations for things to do, places to visit, places to eat etc.?

Definitely a trip to the highlands. Go to the West-end to see the old part and the necropolis for some good views of the city. If you're into golf go check out Top Golf.

Best clubs are: Manuka (Wednesday), Wunder Bar(Saturday) and Fire Water (Thursday) in that order. Sub Club is an honourable mention but only good for house and is \$20-30 to enter.
