Bachelor of Dental Surgery (BDS)

Overview

This report provides historical summary statistics on admissions to the **2026 Bachelor of Dental Surgery (BDS)** programme and statistics for the previous four years: **2022, 2023, 2024 and 2025**.

Admission to the BDS programme is highly competitive, as illustrated in the table below. The number of places available to domestic students is capped by the New Zealand Government, and the number places available to international students is capped by the University.

Admissions Policy for Health Sciences Professional Programmes

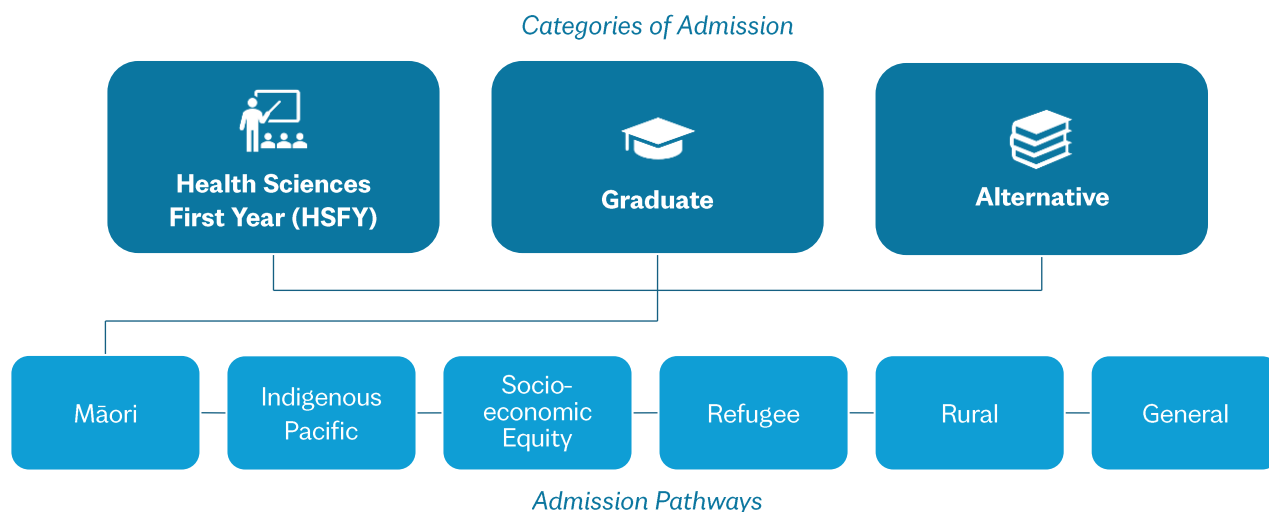

Helpful Information

Admission categories and pathways

As outlined in the [Dentistry: Guidelines for Admission](#) there are three **categories of admission** to the BDS programme and six **admission pathways** within each of the three categories:



International students

International students are students who require a student visa to study in New Zealand and are non-domestic students under the University's fee-paying categories. The total number of places for international students in the BDS programme is restricted.

Data limitations

The number of applications and admissions is sourced from the University's student management system, whereas the number of offers is sourced from other records. We endeavour to ensure the information in this report is accurate, however known data limitations exist, including for example:

- Applicants may apply under multiple admission pathways. An applicant admitted under the Māori pathway may also have been eligible to be admitted under the Rural pathway but will not be considered or counted towards admissions under the Rural pathway. This may cause discrepancies between reported numbers of applications, offers and admissions.
- Applicants gaining an offer of admission to the BDS programme via the Graduate or Alternative categories may be required to pass prescribed papers before being admitted to second year classes. This may cause discrepancies between reported numbers of offers and admissions.

Privacy

It is the University's standard practice not to provide information where it relates to fewer than five individuals. Where the numbers are very low, there is a risk that the identity of individuals could be determined or inferred, and that their personal information could be disclosed. Accordingly, where there are fewer than five individuals in a particular dataset, we have withheld the data and indicated using "<5" ("fewer than five"). We have also used "NA" ("not applicable") where no offers were made.

Scores



The **Health Sciences First Year (HSFY)** category uses '[average academic scores](#)', which are calculated using a student's top seven paper scores across the year. This calculation can include one of the approved optional eighth papers if it is one of a student's top seven scores.



The **Graduate** category uses '[weighted GPA scores](#)', which are calculated from the grades achieved in the qualifying degree, which is usually the first degree awarded to the applicant.



Alternative category assessments are holistic, and while academic record is an assessed factor, a formal score calculation is not made. Accordingly, there are no minimum scores for entry to the BDS programme via the Alternative category, including via the admission pathways.

The interview stage

The Dental Admissions Committee may set a minimum academic requirement for applicants in all admissions categories to proceed to the interview stage. This is determined by the Committee on an annual basis. Candidates will be assessed as suitable for admission based on the interview panel's overall assessment of aptitude for the programme, taking into account motivation, decision-making, and communication skills. Suitable candidates will be put forward for final selection. After meeting this threshold, interview performances are not given weight in the further selection process.

Waiting list scores

Applicants may be offered a place from a waiting list any time right up to the time BDS programme classes begin. From 2024 data on average academic scores to gain an offer of admission has included non-waiting list and waiting list scores (if and where subsequent waiting list offers were made).



*The University defines "first-round" offers as offers of admission not received from the waiting list, or "**non-waiting list**" offers.*

Admission statistics for 2027

Admissions statistics for the 2027 BDS programme are expected to be finalised when all admissions processes are completed, which is usually at the end of March in the year of admission (i.e. March 2027) and will later be made publicly available.
