

Screening Soft Power in China



Conventional wisdom about China's soft power deficit describes only one story — a story that is defined by the nation-state. Yet, this deficit also *screens* (conceals) a surplus of many other — often unrecognized, undervalued, marginalized or even suppressed — local and translocal stories that defy the logic of state sponsored soft power. China's soft power — either programmatically or accidentally — is also developed in different and even conflicting creative practices. Navigating the slippery ground rules of likeability and attraction on Chinese screens big and small, this talk argues that Nye's US-derived concept of soft power can benefit from being *screened* (examined) from a China perspective.

Zooming in on the smaller screens of online participatory cultures and digital spectacles, online animations highlight a largely unrecognized tension (and possibly incompatibility) between persuasion and attraction in Nye's conceptualization of soft power. Notions of "spreadability" and "attraction" can help gain a better, critical understanding of virtual (online) soft power.
