How did the academic experience/workload/style of teaching differ from Otago?

Definitely different to Otago but I enjoyed it much more. Class sizes around 30 people so quite small and class participation is graded so expect to talk in class. I would describe to just like a tutorial at Otago it is more like a conversation with the whole class rather than a lecture where the lecturer just talks. In terms of workload there is a lot of smaller tasks like homework every week but this stuff is easy and if u keep up with it you will be fine. Unlike Otago the final exams at UT are mostly quite low percentage around 20% max which is nice as all the rest of load comes in those smaller homework's

or assignments. Overall I found it much easier to Otago considering I enjoyed this way of learning and having to keep up with work much easier to get information in my head.

Accommodation

What accommodation did you stay in? What were the pros and cons of your accommodation?

I stay in an off-campus accommodation like less than 5 min walk to campus called Laurel house which was part of College Houses (search collage houses Austin on google). Best house in terms of collage houses. We hosted some parties and lots of group events so you end up knowing all 60 of you that live there like one whole family. College Houses because its so cheap to live you are obligated to do 4 hours of labour a week. This could be cooking or cleaning not that bad at all and you get to do it with friends so makes it fun. Everything is included in price including food and power, Wi-Fi etc. Lots of exchange students live in these accommodations as well as Americans so you get the best of both worlds. Other options would be renting rooms in apartments (which are much nicer but more expensive and you can find people subleasing rooms for a single semester on Facebook pages if just staying for 1 semester)

VISA: \$760 NZD total for all costs from forms to shipping of forms. (I didn't have to go to Auckland embassy for an interview but you might have to so keep that in mind!)

UT Austin Fees (including the school's compulsory health insurance): \$2623 NZD for semester

Student Safe Travel Insurance: \$776 NZD covers everything you need like health to lost baggage etc.

Overall I would suggest saving 10,000 before you come and even more if you plan on traveling around USA. (it's an expensive country)

What means did you use to access your finances? What would you recommend? (Credit card, Cash passport, foreign bank account, etc.)

I got a wise card in NZ before I came to USA and I highly recommend was very easy and simple to use. You just upload money through the app and it transfers your NZD to USD for you with very little fees and you can choose when to convert it based on conversion rate. You can have a digital card (apple pay) and physical card and super easy to do everything though the app.

Visas & Insurance

Did you have to apply for a visa? What was the process?

Yes I did have to apply for a visa and let me say it's not the easiest process in the entire world. It involves applying for a J1 (exchange student visa) online then you may or may not be expected to interview in Auckland (so beware of that extra cost) I ended up not having to do an interview but I do know people who did so prepare in advance. It is a very lengthy and expensive process involving lots of forms and getting papers signed and sent back and forth so make sure you start it early.

Did your host university have a mandatory insurance?

Yes it does! Overall it was just over \$1000 USD for the 1 semester.

Extra-curricular/Social Activities

What organised activities were available to students? What extra-curricular activities would you recommend to future exchange students?

There are heaps of activities to do for exchange students and normal students. There are heaps of events throughout the year for exchange students including welcome evenings and group catch ups. I would recommend starting in the fall semester as this is the start of there year so heaps of o week type of events on where there is less in spring semester. There are many clubs to join and be part of and also sports. I joined the swim team where we trained socially and competed against other universities in US, we went out for dinner and thanksgiving diner together so I would recommend joining a club or sport you are interested in, you meet the best people. Also recommend planet longhorn (international club) which has events on every week run by students like they host pres for parties and fun weekend events like I went on a fun boat party!

What was the university/city like?

The university is in the city of Austin, Texas which is known as the "Live Music Capital of the World". There are heaps of things to do in and around Austin. The campus is quite big but being in Texas where everything is bigger I thought it might be a bit bigger. It is a very pretty and stunning campus, the gym is massive which includes an indoor pool and outdoor pool including a leisure pool so in the 42 degrees you can swim and tan on campus for free or even have a spa and sauna in the winter.
