Any comments about these papers?

The law paper was similar to Otago, in the way that it was a 100% end of semester exam but the law was a little different as Scots law is a mixed legal system containing both common law and civil law elements. This tripped me up a few times but other than that it was relatively easy.

How did the academic experience/ workload/ style of teaching differ from Otago?

Firstly the semester is set up a little differently, without a mid-semester break and a 3-4week break after study and before exams. Otherwise it was pretty similar teaching wise, with 2-3 hours of lectures a week + labs and tutorials for some of the papers. The workload was also quite similar. My finance classes were much smaller and lectures took place in tutorial (like) rooms as opposed to lecture theatres.

Accommodation

What accommodation did you stay in? What were the pros and cons of your accommodation?

I stayed in Murano, the biggest and most social hall of residence. I lived in a building with 3 floors, 12 people each floor and so we had a massive group of friends. Our building was all international exchange students so even though Murano is technically a first year hall, majority of the people I lived with were over 20 years old. Although the hall isn't the newest or nicest to choose from, it had everything I really needed. Because it is a first year (party) hall similar to Unicol there is quite a bit of noise at night and early in the morning, I personally didn't care but may be something to bear in mind.

I paid for my hall as a lump sum at the beginning of the year and it was around \$4,000, which I would recommend doing if you can as it means you can budget for the rest of the trip. My flights cost around \$3,000 return but if you get onto it early you may find some good deals for around \$2,500. I spent around \$30-\$40 on food per week although expect to spend more if you are eating out. My insurance cost around \$500.

I originally applied for my visa online however I canceled it as the process was going to take too long. If you want to be safe then I recommend you apply for your visa as early as possible, but otherwise you can just turn up at the UK border with all your documents e.g. Acceptance letter from Glasgow University, learning agreement, proof of accomodation and any other documents you think relevant (look at the check list on the UK immigration website)

Many clubs and social activities were available to students and cost approximately \$40 to sign up for. I would recommend going to the one of the weekly club pub nights of the clubs you are interested in joining before signing up. Also go to the gym as it has a pool, work out rooms and free classes (you get a free membership if you are in a hall)

What was the university/ city like?

The West End where the University is located is very cool with lots of vintage shops, cafes and bars/restaurants. There are also two parks (Kelvingrove & the botanical gardens) and a couple of museums around the University area.

To get into the city you can either catch a bus or walk (Buchanan street & Sauchiehall street are where all the shops and clubs are)

Any recommendations for things to do, places to visit, places to eat etc.?

Go to all the touristy type places like the Glasgow cathedral, the necropolis, see the highland cows, go to the various museums, do a whiskey tour, do a day trip to Loch Lomond, Stirling and Edinburgh. Also enjoy the night life!
