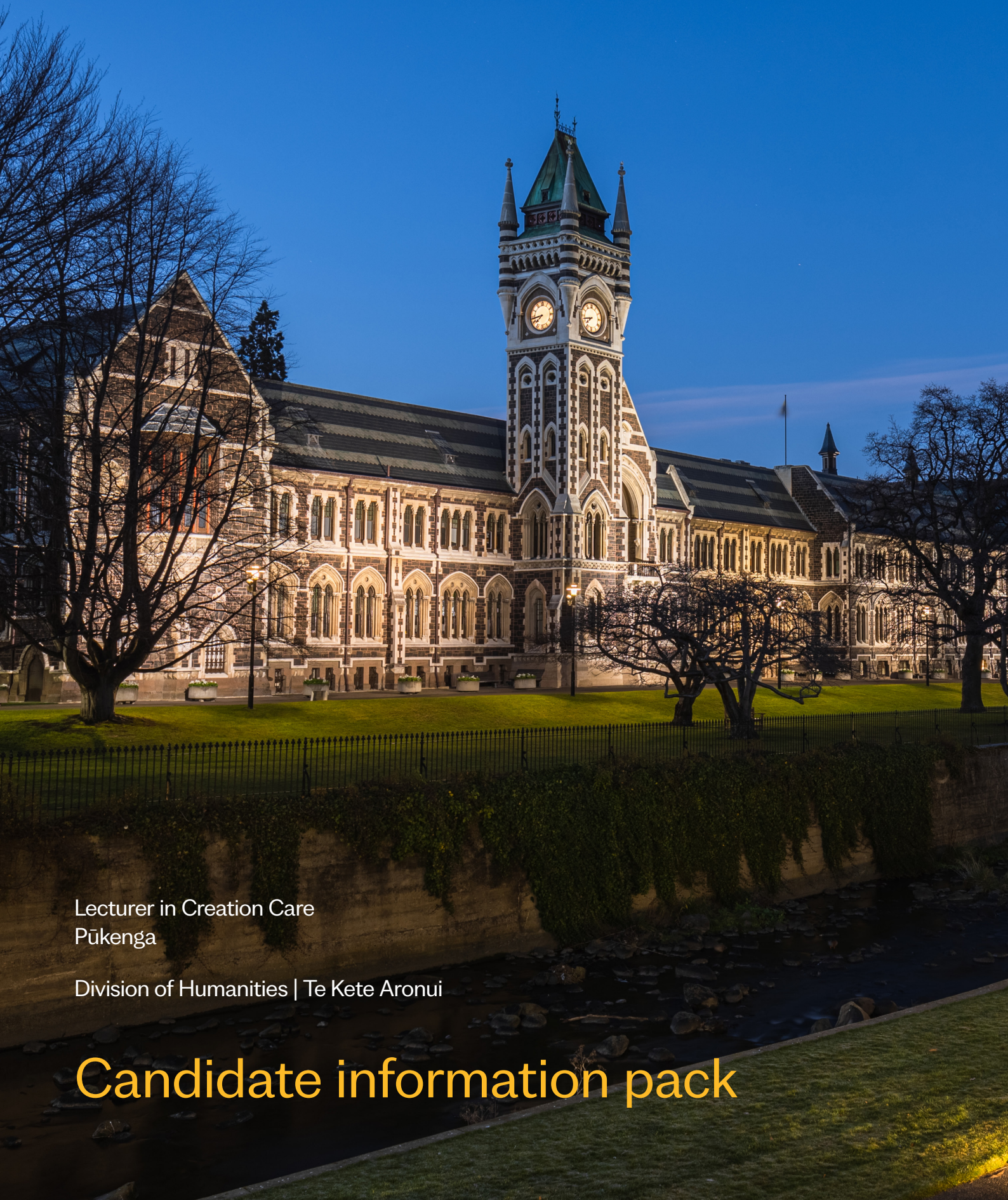

About the role Mō te tūnga

The Theology Programme

Theology has been taught at the University of Otago for eighty years. The Theology Programme is part of the School of Arts in the Division of Humanities. The Programme offers courses in Biblical Studies, Christian Thought and History, and Pastoral Theology.

Theology at Otago is taught ecumenically and in a spirit of open enquiry. The Programme attracts many students from other areas in the Humanities, Education, Sciences, Commerce, and Law. While the Programme exists within a public university context, it also has strong and long-standing links with a wide variety of churches throughout New Zealand.

Currently, the Theology Programme has eleven academic staff and a number of associated teachers who contribute to the teaching programme. The Theology Programme teaches the BTheol and BTheol (Hons) degrees; the BA and BA (Hons) degrees in Biblical Studies and Christian Thought and History; a one-year undergraduate Diploma of Theology; the Diploma for Graduates; a Postgraduate Diploma in Theology, and Master of Theology; a Postgraduate Diploma and Masters in Ministry; a Postgraduate Certificate, Diploma and Masters in Chaplaincy; a Postgraduate Diploma and Masters in Faith-based Leadership and Management and the PhD.

The Theology Programme currently has around 350 individuals enrolled in its programmes, amounting to around 117 equivalent full-time students. There are currently 37 students enrolled in the postgraduate qualifications in Chaplaincy. The Programme offers a range of Theology papers on the University's Distance Learning Network, and has over 35 postgraduate research students, many at PhD level.

The Role of the Lecturer in Creation Care

The Theology Programme at the University of Otago, Mātai Whakapono Karaitiana, is seeking a full-time Lecturer in Creation Care.

The newly established Centre for Creation Care is fully integrated within the Theology Programme and will contribute to the broader teaching, research and community engagement of the Programme as a whole. The Lecturer will participate as a full member of staff in all aspects of the Programme including staff meetings, postgraduate seminars, and other Programme activities. While contributing to the goals and successful operation of the Theology Programme as a whole, the Lecturer will have particular responsibility to undertake teaching and research in the area of Creation Care and to contribute to the development and activity of the Centre for Creation Care by

advancing its mission in community engagement and public impact.

Key Responsibilities

- To teach a portfolio of papers offering Christian theological perspectives on the care of creation.
- To contribute to research-based knowledge, teaching, and publication as appropriate.
- To foster the research of postgraduate students through supervision of research essays and theses.
- To disseminate the results of research through such activities as publication of articles and books, the presentation of lectures, seminars, short courses, and preaching.
- To contribute to the development and activity of the Centre for Creation Care by advancing its mission in community engagement and public impact.

Contribution to the Theology Programme

In collaboration with all other staff in the Theology Programme, ensure that research and teaching in Creation Care aligns with and contributes to the growth and development of the Theology Programme and to the realisation of the goals and mission of the Theology Programme as a whole.

Stakeholder Engagement

Cultivate and maintain relationships with churches, professional bodies, and organisations involved in the care of creation throughout Aotearoa New Zealand.

Fundraising and Sustainability

- Assist with and support fundraising initiatives to ensure the long-term viability of Centre for Creation Care at the University.
- Apply for grant funding where appropriate to support research in the care of creation.

Parental leave without pay of up to 52 weeks including paid parental leave of up to twelve weeks' salary may be granted. The Otago University Childcare Centre operates childcare facilities covering the period from birth to five years.

Māori partnerships and the Māori Strategic Framework

While the University has a special partnership with Ngāi Tahu, as mana whenua within its takiwā (tribal area) of Te Wai Pounamu, it also has Tiriti-based partnerships with a number of other iwi: Ngāti Whātua, Ngāti Porou Hauora (Ngāti Porou), Ngāti Toa, Te Atiawa and Tipu Ora Charitable Trust (Te Arawa).

The University's commitment to iwi aspirations and Māori development is articulated in its Māori Strategic Framework, which is a platform for the collective commitment to excellence in educational outcomes for all who come to Ōtākou Whakaihu Waka.

Division of Humanities Te Kete Aronui

The Division of Humanities explores how humans understand, shape and engage with their worlds – past, present and future. Through teaching, research, creative practice and community engagement, the Division advances knowledge of culture, society, language, belief and identity, fostering critical thinking, ethical leadership and social responsibility in Aotearoa New Zealand, the Pacific and worldwide.

Teaching and academic disciplines

The Division of Humanities encompasses a wide range of disciplines across the arts, social sciences, education, law, theology, and creative and performing arts. Teaching and learning are strongly research-informed and grounded in professional and creative practice, encouraging students to think critically, communicate effectively and engage thoughtfully with complex human challenges.

Campuses, leadership and structures

The Division of Humanities is primarily based on the University's Dunedin campus, with teaching and research also delivered through the College of Education, specialist centres and networks, and extensive national and international partnerships.

The Division is led by the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Humanities), with Heads of School responsible for academic leadership, teaching quality, research performance, and operational management, in alignment with divisional and University strategies.

Scale and people

The Division of Humanities enrolls approximately 5,000 equivalent full-time students (EFTS) across undergraduate and postgraduate programmes.

Teaching and research are supported by several hundred academic and professional staff, including internationally recognised scholars, educators, creative practitioners and professional experts. Staff bring cutting-edge research, creative practice and professional knowledge into teaching, providing students with a rich, intellectually stimulating and supportive learning environment.

Research excellence and impact

The Division of Humanities maintains a strong tradition of research in Aotearoa New Zealand, the Pacific, and across the globe. Its research contributes to understanding individuals and communities, fostering deeper insight into human experience, and humanity's place in a rapidly changing world.

Staff undertake both theoretical and field-based research across a wide range of areas, including social and cultural history, migration and mobility, environmental change, indigenous knowledge systems, education, governance, law, religion and creative practice. Examples of recent research include studies of climate change adaptation and migration in the Pacific, wānanga immersion programmes for Māori language and culture, cultural transformation in the performing arts, and the social histories of communities formed during the Otago gold rush.

Research in the Division is inclusive, interdisciplinary and highly collaborative, engaging iwi, Pacific communities, public agencies, cultural institutions and international partners. Divisional researchers are consistent recipients of competitive external funding and contribute actively to public scholarship, policy development and cultural life.



Recent international rankings and national research quality evaluations confirm the Division's research excellence, with Otago ranked among the global leaders in disciplines including Archaeology, Anthropology, Development Studies, Religious Studies and Theology, Education, English, Geography, History, Philosophy, Social Policy and related fields.

Research infrastructure, resources and collections

Humanities researchers benefit from access to exceptional research infrastructure and collections, including:

- Hocken Collections – one of Aotearoa New Zealand's foremost research libraries, housing rare books, manuscripts, photographs, maps and archives of national and international significance.
- Digital Humanities Hub – a specialist facility supporting digital research methods and the study of digital technologies, culture and communication.
- Archaeological laboratories – including extensive reference collections equipped with Geographic Information System (GIS) facilities.
- Performing Arts Centre – state-of-the-art performance, rehearsal and recording spaces supporting creative research and teaching.

Each year, the Division also hosts the Otago Arts Fellows, whose residencies enrich the cultural, intellectual and creative life of the University and the wider community.

The University of Otago Ōtākou Whakaihu Waka

Founded in 1869, the University of Otago is New Zealand's first university and remains one of its most highly regarded. Today, Otago is a vibrant, research-intensive institution with a strong sense of purpose, known for academic excellence, intellectual curiosity and a deeply collegial culture.

We are proud of the breadth and quality of our work across the Health Sciences, Humanities, Sciences and Business. Otago consistently performs at the highest level across national education and research benchmarks, including the Tertiary Education Commission's performance indicators, and has an exceptional record in the national Tertiary Teaching Excellence Awards.

Teaching and learning at Otago

Otago offers more than 300 undergraduate and postgraduate programmes, taught by academics who are leaders in their fields and deeply committed to student success. Teaching is research-informed, student-centred and supported by strong professional services and modern learning environments.

Around 5,000 of our students are enrolled at postgraduate level, reflecting the central role that research and advanced scholarship play in the life of the University. The academic year generally runs from February to November, across two 13-week semesters, with additional flexibility through Summer School and a growing range of distance and blended learning options.

Research excellence with real-world impact

Research underpins everything we do. Otago is home to New Zealand's first medical school and the country's only schools of dentistry and surveying. We are also the sole national provider of Radiation Therapy and an undergraduate degree in Neuroscience.

Our researchers hold leadership roles in national centres of research excellence and partner across all National Science Challenges. Otago hosts a wide range of multidisciplinary research centres and themes, including two of the world's most respected longitudinal health and development studies. We foster a research environment that supports researchers at all career stages, with programmes and groups dedicated to early and mid-career development, strong interdisciplinary collaboration, and a commitment to academic freedom and scholarly exchange.



Our campuses and community

The University of Otago's main campus is located in Dunedin, with teaching, research and student life closely integrated in a compact, campus-based setting. The layout encourages connection across disciplines and contributes to a strong sense of academic community.

Otago also has major Health Sciences campuses in Christchurch and Wellington, along with a presence in Invercargill and Auckland. This national footprint supports clinical education, research partnerships and engagement across Aotearoa New Zealand.

With more than 85 per cent of students coming from outside Dunedin, Otago has a distinctive residential campus culture. Fifteen colleges are located close to the academic heart of the University, playing an important role in student support, pastoral care and community life, and contributing to the University's strong sense of belonging.

Our values: partnership, inclusion and sustainability

The University of Otago is deeply committed to its role in Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond. We actively support the aspirations of Māori and Pacific peoples and have memoranda of understanding with a number of iwi, particularly Ngāi Tahu, the mana whenua of our Dunedin campus. Living in Dunedin Te noho ki Ōtepoti

Dunedin is a city with deep roots, strong character and a remarkable sense of place. The University of Otago's southern identity is grounded in its enduring partnership with mana whenua Ngāi Tahu, and in the legacy of the Scottish settlers who founded the University just 21 years after the province of Otago was established.

Ōtepoti is the Māori name for the upper harbour area where Dunedin developed. The wider city boundary also encompasses the papatipu rūnanga at Ōtākou, at the tip of the Otago Peninsula, and Puketeraki in Karitāne to the north. The region is rich with Māori history and the stories of Ngāi Tahu whānui, who have lived in and cared for this place for generations.

A small city with a big heart

Home to around 130,000 people, Dunedin offers the best of both worlds: the cultural depth and amenities of a larger city, paired with the friendliness, safety and ease of a smaller one. Commutes are short, neighbourhoods are distinct and welcoming, and it is easy to feel part of the community.

The city's prosperity during the 1860s Otago gold rush left a lasting legacy of striking Victorian and Edwardian architecture, giving Dunedin a distinctive and elegant streetscape that continues to define its character.

Culture, creativity and ideas

Dunedin has a thriving cultural life. It boasts a strong performing arts scene, nationally significant museums and galleries, excellent libraries, and a lively calendar of festivals and events. The city's creative and literary heritage is internationally recognised through its designation as a UNESCO City of Literature.

Outdoors at your doorstep

For sport and recreation, Dunedin offers outstanding facilities, including one of New Zealand's only covered stadiums. The natural environment is never far away: sweeping beaches, coastal walks, forest reserves and internationally renowned wildlife sanctuaries are all close to the city.

The Otago Peninsula is home to the world's only mainland royal albatross colony, as well as rare penguins, seals and sea lions, making wildlife encounters a part of everyday life for many residents.

Food, markets and green spaces

The compact city centre is lined with cafés, restaurants and bars, alongside boutique shopping and modern retail precincts. A popular weekly farmers' market showcases the region's high-quality local produce and reflects Dunedin's strong food culture.

Early urban planning ensured the city is rich in parks, gardens and green spaces, while hillside suburbs offer expansive views across the harbour, ocean and surrounding landscapes.

Gateway to the South

Dunedin is also the gateway to Central Otago. The alpine resort towns of Wānaka and Queenstown are just over three hours' drive away, opening up easy access to skiing, snowboarding, boating, mountain biking, hiking and some of New Zealand's finest vineyards and wineries.

A true education city

Education is central to Dunedin's identity and economy. In addition to the University of Otago, the city is home to a thriving polytechnic and a wide range of high-quality early childhood, primary and secondary schools. Students, staff and their families make up more than a quarter of Dunedin's urban population, contributing significantly to the city's intellectual, cultural and sporting life.

Well connected, locally and globally

Although located in the south of New Zealand, Dunedin is well connected. The region is served by two international airports with direct flights to Australia, and the city is New Zealand's first GigCity, offering ultra-fast broadband services that support modern work, research and business.

Dunedin also maintains sister city relationships with Edinburgh (Scotland), Otaru (Japan) and Shanghai (China), reflecting its strong international connections.
