The Electrical Engineering courses (Course code: EE) were very difficult, and my expertise from Computer Science at Otago did not translate to being well prepared. Additionally, EE 422C was a prerequisite for EE 461L, yet I somehow ended up doing both of them.

*How did the academic experience/ workload/ style of teaching differ from Otago?*

There was a much stronger focus on internal work, with more regular small assignments and less weight placed on the exams. This was difficult to adjust to, however it was nice to not have so much riding on the final exams. There was also more of a focus on attendance, with missing classes resulting in loss of points, demoting of letter grades, or even the possibility of immediately receiving a failing grade.

## Accommodation

*What accommodation did you stay in? What were the pros and cons of your accommodation?*

I stayed in a Cooperative housing environment, which I enjoyed thoroughly. It was to be as I immediately had a social circle and social calendar that helped me adjust to being in Austin, and the labour system - (all residents did 5 hours of labour a week around the coop e.g. cooking, cleaning etc), meant that housing was affordable and gave everyone who lived there a sense of ownership and working as a collective. There was often disputes in the coop, and it was a very unique way of living that took some time to adjust to, however overall it was an amazing experience.

Accommodation was relatively cheap, as the labour system meant there were no hired staff living in the coop. Flights and the Visa process were very expensive, yet this is to be expected. Food was a bit cheaper, and insurance was quite cheap (health was covered by UT Austin, and belongings insurance was cheap)

I used a cash passport, with a credit card on hand in case of emergencies.

Yes, I had to apply online filling out a large number of forms, then arrange an appointment at the US Consulate in Auckland. This was a very irritating process, as the appointment times fill up very quickly and I could not get one until just a few weeks before I planned to leave, resulting in a great deal of stress regarding if my visa would arrive in time. Thankfully it did, however I would strongly urge the exchange office to heavily emphasise the importance of booking this appointment months in advance.

*Did your host university have a mandatory insurance?*

Yes, UT Austin had mandatory health insurance.
