Paul Scuffham is the Inaugural Professor of Health Economics at Griffith University. Her PhD included cost effectiveness analyses of the Otago Exercise Programme and psychotropic medication withdrawal. She is an author of 5 of the 10 published comprehensive economic evaluations carried out as part of falls prevention RCTs.
