ABSTRACT GUIDELINES

Abstract

Abstract Information

Please provide the following information about the abstract:

Title: Up to 50 words and providing a 'stand-alone' description of the research.

Authors: Full first name, one middle initial where applicable, and full last name for each author. Superscript numbers linking authors name to relevant affiliation(s). Indicate the presenting speaker by underlining their name. Do not include academic degrees or titles.

Author affiliations: All relevant affiliations including department, institution, city and country for each.

Author contact details: please provide e-mail and telephone contact details for the presenting/corresponding author.

Abstract text

The body of the abstract text is limited to 250 words and must be submitted in MS Word using 10 point Arial font. Please do not use all italic, all bold or all caps styles. Two options are available for abstract structure:

1. Quantitative research

Background: Indicate the purpose and objective of the research, the hypothesis that was tested or a description of the problem being analyzed or evaluated.

Methods: Describe the setting/location for the study, study design, study population, ethical considerations, data collection and methods of analysis used.

Results: Present as clearly and detailed as possible the findings/outcome of the study, with specific results in summarized form.

Conclusions: Briefly discuss the data and main outcome of the study. Emphasize the relevance of the results to global health.

2. Qualitative research

Unstructured abstracts are acceptable for presentation of the abstract body. All other guidelines apply as outlined above.

Points to note:

- Submissions are open to published and unpublished work.
- Preference will be given to 'original research' with a focus on global health research in low-resource settings.
- Abstracts will be not be edited or altered

Presentation formats

1. Regular presentations

In general, presentations will be allocated fifteen minutes and as a guide allow:

- ten minutes for presentation,
- five minutes for questions, and
- approximately ten to twelve slides.

2. Student Presentations/Posters

Students have the option of either an oral presentation (as above), or a poster.

Before submitting your abstract please ensure your supervisor has reviewed it. Also please talk to your supervisor as to where there are any funds available to support conference travel and other costs if required. We expect to have a small number of scholarships available to assist students presenting at conference with travel and accommodation if required. More information will be available shortly

Eligibility:

- you must be a current student, or
- have graduated in the previous 12 months and be presenting your research.
- when submitting your abstract, please advise
 - that it is a student submission and
 - whether it is an oral or poster presentation.

i. Student oral presentations

In general, presentations will be allocated fifteen minutes and as a guide allow:

- ten minutes for presentation,
- five minutes for questions, and
- approximately ten to twelve slides.

Please note: if your abstract is not accepted for an oral presentation you may be asked to present it as a poster.

ii. Student poster presentations

Posters are short papers presented as a printed poster and displayed during the conference.

The finished poster must be

- No larger than A0 size, portrait (840mm x 1188mm)
- Include:
 - A title
 - Names and affiliation of all authors
 - e-mail for at least one author
