My Exchange to Dalhousie has been one of the most enriching experiences of my life. I have seen and done things I never thought I would and have made some of the most amazing friends along the way.

Dalhousie itself is a nice, reasonably contained campus with everything within an arm's reach. Located in Halifax, the heart of Nova Scotia, you should have no problem adapting to the size of campus or way of life. It is similar size to Otago and the people are just as friendly. Being in the Maritimes, the people from Halifax are extremely friendly and always there to show you the ropes if need be.

Accommodation:

I had food already prepaid however, and this is where a lot of my friends seem to spend a lot more than they meant to. Another big expenditure is alcohol. The most expensive part was travelling by far. You want to see everything you can whilst you are there so why not take every opportunity to travel? I was lucky as there was a group of about 15 of us who travelled together which made mass bookings cheaper but bear this in mind when planning adventures.
