*How did the academic experience/ workload/ style of teaching differ from Otago?*

I found the course work relatively easy compared to Otago. My classes were small and were quite interactive. My accounting class were predominately online so I did not have to attend classes which was great as I had more flexibility. My lecturers were all very helpful and laid back.

### Accommodation

*What accommodation did you stay in? What were the pros and cons of your accommodation?*

I stayed in Birkbeck Court. It was very basic but nice and clean with good heating. The rooms were very small, but the living room was a nice area to hang out in. The halls of resident's setup was very cool in Strathclyde. All the halls were located within the same area, therefore all the international students resided close together.

Pros:

- Birkbeck was the cheapest hall (\$175 NZD per week). Birkbeck was only a minute walk to the library and the gym (which you got free access to fitness classes, the pool, sauna, steam room, basketball courts etc). The campus bar called 'Todds' was a minute walk from the halls and it became a place in which all my mates would hang out together.
- My flat mates were from all around the world. Learning each other's ways of life was very interesting. They were from Canada, France, Singapore, California, and Indiana. They were great guys and we did a lot of travel together.
- Classes at Strathclyde ended late March. This meant I had one and a half months to study for my exams. This was a great opportunity to travel around Europe with friends.

Cons:

- Birkbeck was much smaller in comparison to the other halls at Strathclyde.
- It would be difficult to meet Scottish students unless you joined a club.

Travelling around Europe can be expensive. I recommend being frugal and visiting the cheaper countries. "Eat boring live interesting" was a saying I tried to stick too, which allowed me to explore more countries.

I used a cash passport and a visa card. I got a Monzo card which I highly recommend. All you have to do is load money from your New Zealand eftpos card onto the Monzo for a small fee and afterwards there is no international fee for each transaction. The international fee was much lower than what the New Zealand banks had on offer. The Monzo card works all around the world and it automatically uses that countries currency you are in.

## Extra-curricular/Social Activities

Strathclyde had an abundance of social events and activities on offer for students. In orientation week there was a lot of pub crawls, sports events, and meet and greets. So, you get to meet a lot of international students in the first week. Every Monday and Tuesday nights they had sports events at the gym for exchange students. Also, every Monday night is the campus pub quiz which all the international students get along to.

There is a lot of clubs to join in Strathclyde. I joined the Wakeboarding club and the Surf Club. The surf club was very social and had socials every two weeks and monthly weekend surf trips around Scotland and England. In January I went surfing in Saint Andrews with the club and it was snowing! Also, at the end of the semester we went on a week-long surf camp in Northern Spain which was definitely one of the highlights of my exchange. The people in the club were great value. Even if you have not even tried surfing, I strongly recommend joining this club.

There were plenty of organised trips around Scotland available to exchange students. Tours ran almost every weekend until May and they only cost around 25 pounds. I managed to go to Saint Andrews, the Highlands, and the Isle of Skye on these trips. Isle of Skye is a must do!

Flying around Europe can be really cheap. Ryanair offers cheap flights, especially from Edinburgh and Prestwick (which are both an hour bus ride away). I made it to the Netherlands, Belgium, England, Spain, Portugal, Morocco, France, Hungary, Slovakia, Austria, Czech Republic, Dubai, Slovenia, Germany, Greece, and Croatia. Mega bus was a great way to travel around Scotland and the UK.

*What was the university/ city like?*

Glasgow is a very lively and trendy city. At first you will have trouble understanding the locals but they have a wonderful sense of humour and are very friendly. The weather is similar to Dunedin but consistently colder. When I was there it did not rain much and the sun came out quite a lot however the temperature was still chilly. The weather got into the early 20s for some parts in April and May. The West End of the city is very beautiful with old buildings, nice parks and pubs. The nightlife in Glasgow is incredible and you can go out any night of the week and the clubs are all pumping.
