## Cultural Safety and Anti-Racism Resources


The majority of good resources focus on cultural safety and racism in a healthcare setting, rather than an educational setting. However, principles can be taken from Health resources and applied Education. Below are some examples of resources you can adapt and implement.

### Unteach Racism

This resource, produced by the Teaching Council of Aotearoa New Zealand, is primarily aimed at secondary school educators, but it contains a lot of useful strategies for people of all ages, and features a nice 3-minute video of Taika Waititi talking to his younger self. Click the icons to the right to visit the sites.

The resource consists of eight modules. In particular, check out **Module 5 – “Racist Exchanges”**, which focuses on sensitive and practical methods of confronting racism.

The website also offers a helpful glossary of terms addressed within the site, as well as in real-life discussion. What is “implicit bias”? What is “transactionality”? The definitions of these and many other terms can be found in this glossary.
