This paper introduces students to the basic vocabulary, grammar, and syntax of “Biblical” Hebrew as represented in the Bible and in ancient Hebrew inscriptions. This core vocabulary and familiarity with the foundations of Hebrew grammar and syntax will enable students to read and translate basic texts from the Hebrew Scriptures. Communication with students will be conducted via the students’ university email accounts in accordance with university policy.

Hebrew lexica (dictionaries)

The best lexica currently available are:

- Brown, Francis, S.R. Driver, and C.A. Briggs, 1979 [1906]. *The New Brown-Driver-Briggs-Genesius Hebrew-English Lexicon with an Appendix containing the Biblical Aramaic*. Peabody, MA: Hendrickson. [invaluable for serious scholars, although can be a bit difficult to navigate for new learners, and now seriously out-of-date in places]
- Clines, David J.A., ed. *The Concise Dictionary of Classical Hebrew*. Sheffield: Sheffield Phoenix Press, 2009. [there is a complete 8-volume edition of this major work, *The Dictionary of Classical Hebrew*]
- Holladay, William L. *A Concise Hebrew and Aramaic Lexicon of the Old Testament*. Leiden: Brill, 1988. [a great resource for beginners – easy to use]
- Koehler, Ludwig, and Walter Baumgartner. *The Hebrew and Aramaic Lexicon of the Old Testament: Study Edition*. 2 vols. Leiden: Brill, 2001. [not for the fainthearted, but wonderfully thorough – a scholar's paradise!]
